
College isn't all about academics.

THE GOLDEN GATORS

San Francisco State has a vibrant and competitive athletics program. The Gators are a member of NCAA Division II and compete in the California Collegiate Athletic Association, with men's wrestling competing in the Rocky Mountain Athletic Conference.

In 2018-19, every single one of the Gators' 13 teams advanced to the postseason, led by the women's track & field team, which won back-to-back CCAA Championships and placed fifth at the NCAA Outdoor Championships. That feat helped the Gators finish fourth in the CCAA's Hiegart Commissioner's Cup standings.

The Gators also excel in the classroom, with 73 Gator student-athletes named to the most recent CCAA All-Academic list.



ELIGIBILITY REQUIREMENTS

- ☐ Graduate from high school (diploma or GED).
- ☐ Complete the required college preparatory courses (requirements A-G) with a grade of C- or better. (Table 1)
- ☐ Submit SAT or ACT scores (completed no later than Dec.) and meet or exceed the CSU Eligibility Index. (Table 2)

ELIGIBILITY INDEX

Resident or California High School Graduate

ACT or SAT score required for regular admission by grade point average (GPA). A grade point average of 3.0 and above qualifies with any score. A grade point average below 2.0 does not qualify for regular admission. (Table 2)

Non-Resident or Non-California High School Graduate

ACT or SAT score required for regular admission by grade point average (GPA). A grade point average of 3.61 and above qualifies with any score. A grade point average below 2.47 does not qualify for regular admission.

ADVANCED PLACEMENT EXAMINATION

AP: Students may earn up to six semester units of baccalaureate credit for each Advanced Placement examination of the College Entrance Examination Board in which the applicant receives a score of 3, 4 or 5.

IB: International Baccalaureate courses designated as honors courses on the UC "A-G" list are awarded extra grade points for computation of the high school GPA. Students may earn up to six semester units of credit for each examination in which the applicant received a score of four or higher.

CLEP: Students may earn units of baccalaureate credit for College Level Entrance Program examinations which may be applied toward the degree and/or admission eligibility.

RECEIVING COLLEGE CREDIT

Baccalaureate-level courses taken in high school may be awarded transfer credit unless the college or university transcript designates that the courses were used solely to meet high school graduation requirements.

ACADEMIC READINESS

In order to increase education equity and improve student success, the CSUs are now using multiple measures (test scores, GPAs and senior-year coursework) to guide student placement into first-year math and English courses. Students can find their respective English and math pathways by accessing the Holds and Alerts section of their Student Center. Pathway information may change after students' final transcripts are processed by admissions. Students should check their Student Center regularly. FRESHMAN RESOURCES Metro Academies College Success Program

The Metro Academies College Success Program (Metro) was developed to support the next generation of leaders in urban communities. Each Metro Academy is a "school within a school" to give students an educational home in the first two years of college. At the core of Metro is a learning community made up of two linked courses each semester, pairing a general education course and a Metro course. To apply, visit metro.sfsu.edu.

Educational Opportunity Program (EOP) and Summer Bridge

Students who identify as first-generation, low-income should apply for EOP during the CSU application period. Summer Bridge is a non-residential academic EOP program that assists the transition from high school to the university. More information can be found at eop.sfsu.edu.

GRADE POINT AVERAGE (GPA)

A student must have a minimum overall GPA of 2.0. Applicants applying for an impacted major are offered admission based on overall space availability and may be held to a higher GPA standard.

The California Promise program provides access to specialized advising and guaranteed course availability for students who maintain eligibility and are committed to graduating in a two-year time frame. Eligible transfer students are invited to take the California Promise pledge early in the first semester. CSU GE Breadth Sheet

The CSU GE Breadth Sheet helps determine which classes transfer and count toward GE and admission requirements. See your counselor or Transfer Center for a copy.

GE Certification

If you are transferring from a California community college and have courses from other U.S. colleges, obtain a GE certification sheet from your counselor or Transfer Center. This sheet documents how your transferable units from any U.S. college will satisfy GE and admission requirements at SF State.

Impacted Majors

A major is designated impacted when the number of applications from fully eligible students exceeds the number of spaces available. Some majors require a supplemental application and additional requirements for consideration. Check future.sfsu.edu/impaction and department websites for details.

Associate Degree for Transfer (ADT)

Students who earn an Associate
Degree for Transfer (ADT) will
receive admission to a CSU campus
with junior status. Students
who pursue a B.S. or B.A. in a
program deemed "similar" to their
transfer degree can complete the
degree by taking no more than
60 units at the CSU. An ADT may
also provide a GPA advantage
when applying to an impacted
major that is deemed similar.

Students may accept their fall admission offer upon receiving notice of conditional admissions through May 1. Letters of admission will provide instructions on how to accept your admission offer.
