


Master of Arts in International Crime and Justice STUDY IN NEW YORK CITY

A program fueled by faculty

At its heart, our MA program in International Crime and Justice features a faculty committed to developing future leaders in the field. With real-world experience working in agencies and with law enforcement officials, our professors do significant scholarship that effects better policy and meaningful change for those targeted by international crime. And just as global crime has no boundaries, neither does our course of study.

Students gain an integrated perspective from professors who are experts in a host of disciplines, from our Center on Terrorism to departments of Anthropology, Political Science, Sociology, Criminal Justice, Law, Economics, Psychology, History, Police Science and Criminal Justice Administration.

Scanning our faculty's areas of expertise reveals a breadth of experience and insight into the complexities of global crime. We work in such areas as religion, deviance and crime, crime prevention, international relations and human rights, organized crime, gender/family issues and crime, race relations, political violence, genocide, international tribunals, terrorism, comparative policing and counter-terrorism, wildlife crime and environmental criminology, international security, public policy, women in policing and drug abuse. Our geographic focus also ranges far and wide, from Latin America to Europe, from the Middle East to Asia.

Research and analysis opportunities for students

Agencies are looking for the next generation of analysts whom we train in the International Crime and Justice MA Building on the foundation of our undergraduate major in International Crime and Justice (ICJ) and co-sponsored conferences on global social justice and human rights in major European cities, we offer an interdisciplinary Master of Arts program in International Crime and Justice.

We put solid coursework at the program's core including International Crime and Justice Theory, International Economics, Comparative Criminal Justice Systems, International Law and World Order, Culture and Identity in a Global Context, Research Methods in International Crime and Justice and Using Computers in Social Research.

Students then choose from electives to learn state-of-the-art techniques in courses like Homeland Security and International Relations, Terrorism and Human Rights and Human Trafficking.

Experience is also gained through hands-on work with faculty research. Among recent opportunities for students: co-authoring an article on violence against migrant workers and their families with Program Director and Prof. Rosemary Barberet; researching the black market for cigarettes with Prof. Klaus von Lampe; studying drug traffickers' wiretapped conversations with Prof. Mangai Natarajan.

Working alongside faculty provides students with opportunities to practice skills taught in the classroom and put theory into practice. Students then take that training into fieldwork, an extra edge well-suited for positions at agencies such as the DEA, FBI, CIA and Homeland Security, as well as at organizations like the World Bank, the United Nations and Interpol.

Students come from all over the world to study at John Jay College. Mid-career police from as far away as Ireland, Turkey, and Ukraine come to John Jay's Manhattan campus to learn in our classrooms. At the same time, faculty travel to instruct police abroad, such as teaching the Police Staff College, Bramshill in England, where police from Scotlanc Yard do their training.

To further broaden students' horizons, we strongly encourage study abroad options while pursuing this Maste Degree. Students may consider study abroad programs i the summer and winter.
