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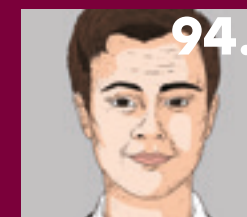

I was the first person in my family to stay at school beyond the age of fifteen, and the first person in my family to go to university. The life I have had, and the choices which I've been able to make were opened up to me by that decision to go to university.

1. In every year of your course, you'll take a work experience module giving you practical skills to take into your future career.
2. You'll have the chance to take a year's work placement, putting your learning into practice in a real job. On some courses, such as those in health and social care or teacher education, several placements are integrated throughout the course.
3. If you complete a placement year you'll receive an applied professional diploma in addition to your degree, helping you stand out to future employers.
4. Our courses are designed with employers, so you graduate with the skills you need to start your career.

What is applied learning?

Applied learning gives you the best of both worlds. You'll learn through reading, lectures and seminars; but you'll also put that learning into practice through workshops, placements and real-world projects. And as you'll see on the coming pages, some of those projects could give you experience with big global brands.

What form does it take?

Every industry is different, and so applied learning varies from course to course.

On our healthcare and teacher education courses you'll practice interacting with patients or delivering lessons, and go out on placement in a variety of settings. On design courses, you'll work on real briefs and create real products – our games design students have made titles for commercial release through PlayStation® Store.

Previous engineering students have taken industrial placements at companies such as McLaren Racing, Rolls-Royce, EDF Energy, and Airbus UK. They also tackled real-world issues through the Engineers without Borders' Engineering for People Design Challenge. Our business students go on placements with global organisations such as Walt Disney World, Lloyds Banking Group and PwC.

Why does it matter?

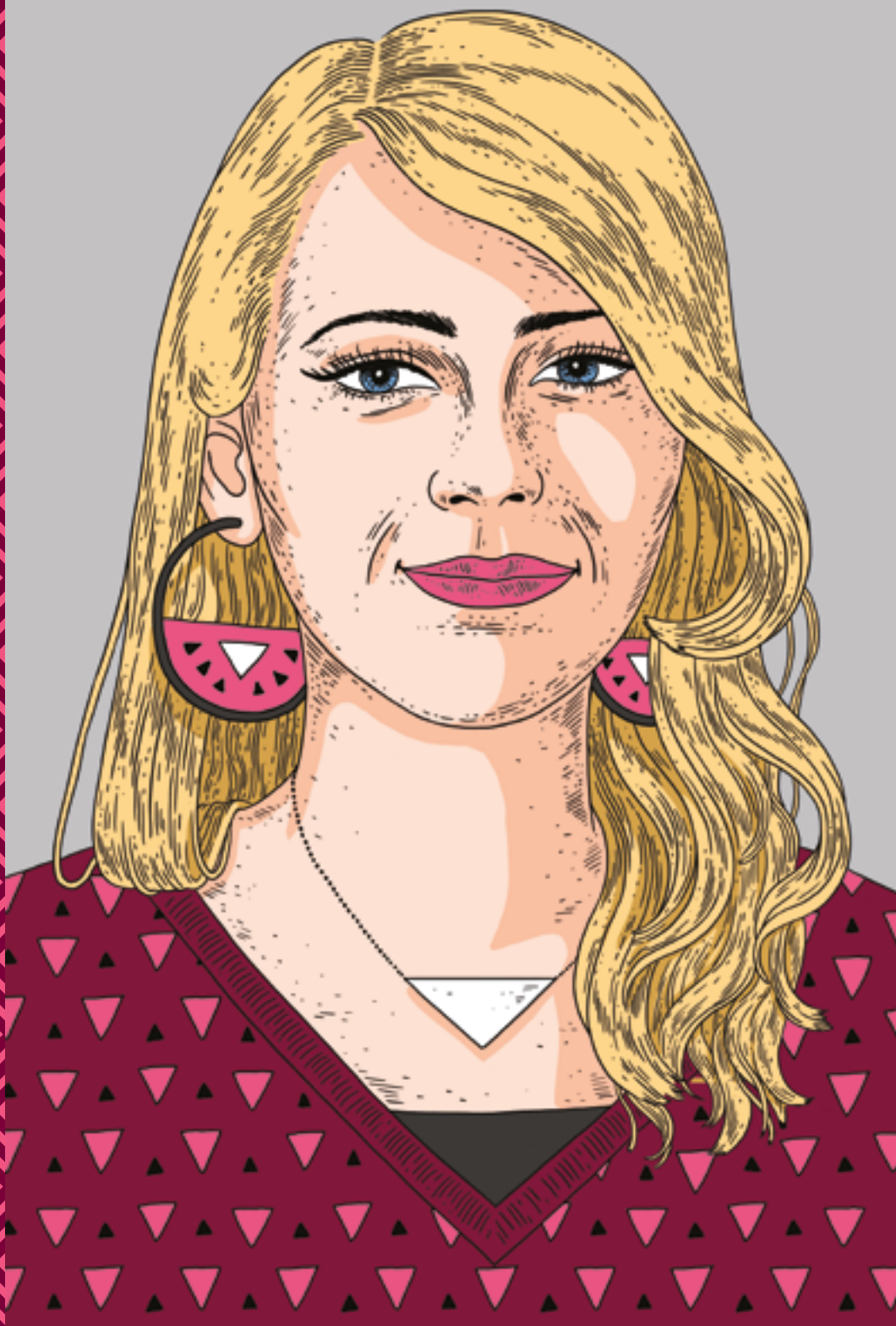
We want you to leave Hallam hungry to get out there and do it.

Jodie Howlett has been named one of Britain's top 50 young female engineers, and is set to study at the International Space University after graduation

What brought you to Hallam?

From a young age, I always enjoyed maths and science at school. Then I discovered engineering and fell in love. It's all about applying the subjects I love to solve problems and create a better world. There were two main reasons I came to Sheffield. Firstly, Hallam has strong links with industry and really encourages work-based learning, like my year-long work placement. Secondly, I really like Sheffield as a city. Location is very important to me, and living in such a friendly and social city with good transport links has been great.

Tell us about your next move

I'm really excited about studying at the International Space University. It should be a fantastic experience and an opportunity to study a fascinating area of engineering, alongside students from different backgrounds and experiences. I'll specialise in one particular area which I hope will be space engineering. I'll be applying my learning through team projects and workshops, working with other students. I really can't wait to get started!

How did your course help you get here?

I've been studying MEng Mechanical Engineering, and the course is a good mix of theory and practical learning. And there are extracurricular projects to get involved in – I've helped to build a subsonic wind tunnel, for example. In my third year I worked at Rolls-Royce in Derby, helping to define concepts for future jet engines. Working for a world-class company allowed me to gain skills that will stay with me for life. I've also gained several scholarships during my studies, and Hallam were great in supporting my applications.

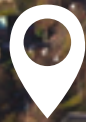

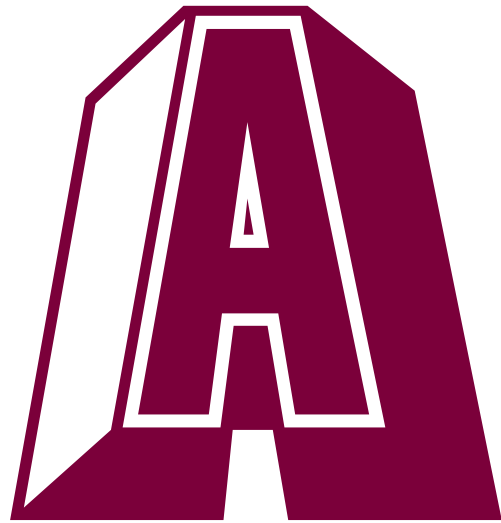


WHAT'S NEXT

Harvey Morton launched an IT business at 15, and grew it into an award-winning digital agency with help from Hallam's Enterprise Team

What brought you to Hallam?

One of the reasons I was attracted to Hallam was because I'd met people studying on the business courses, and I could see how much they enjoyed it. Before that I had never thought of going to university. The business and enterprise management course taught me so many skills: financial management, HR, how to write a business plan, customer service skills. And a lot of the theory has helped with the practical element of running my business.

How did the Enterprise Team support you?

The support from the Enterprise Team was outstanding. I've had access to an amazing team of mentors who have given me valuable advice and helped me to grow my business alongside my studies. It's also been great to meet like-minded people at the University who are also self-employed. To anyone who is thinking of setting up a business whilst at Hallam, do it! The Enterprise Team will support you along the way and it's a great way to make new friends.

Tell us about your award win.

I was named Young Freelancer of the Year by IPSE, the Association of Independent Professionals and the Self-Employed. It was a complete surprise when they announced that I was the winner. I still feel quite overwhelmed. It's a national title and I have had a lot of attention since and I'm not really used to anything on that scale. To be recognised nationally is huge, really.

We're using 3D printing to help babies breathe

Our designers have developed a way of using 3D printers to make oxygen masks for babies with breathing difficulties that fits perfectly to their face, allowing them to breathe in comfort.



02.

We're helping women and girls find justice in India

Our law lecturers are working with Indian police to improve access to justice, rights and protection for female victims of violent crimes such as rape and assault. As a result of our specialist training, crisis centres are being set up in 51 districts.



As well as teaching, our lecturers and researchers work on life-changing projects in areas such as healthcare, engineering and human rights.



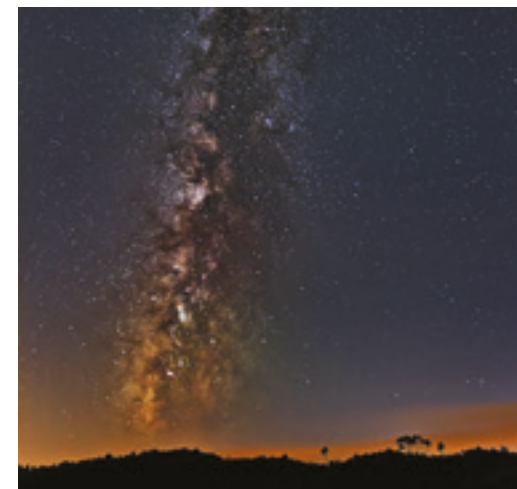

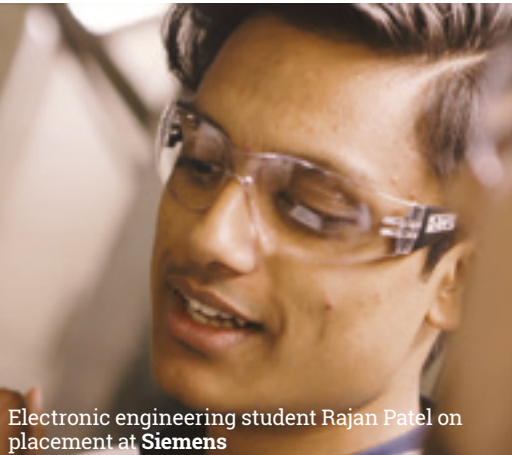

REAL-WORLD PROJECTS

There's more to work experience than a one-off placement. From design briefs to racing competitions, we make real-world challenges a part of your study.

Many of our courses give you the chance to work on genuine business problems with major brands, or to hone your skills in national and global student contests.

Our product design students have devised shaving products for Gillette and rucksacks for Berghaus, and our food and nutrition students have worked with Asda to reduce sugar levels in its own-brand products.

Not only do these projects look good on your CV, they also develop your project management, time management, communication and networking skills – exactly the sort of things employers are looking for.

Best of all, you get to demonstrate your talent to big names in the industry. In 2018, two of our fashion students won paid internships with Vivienne Westwood after wowing senior designers with their response to a brief.

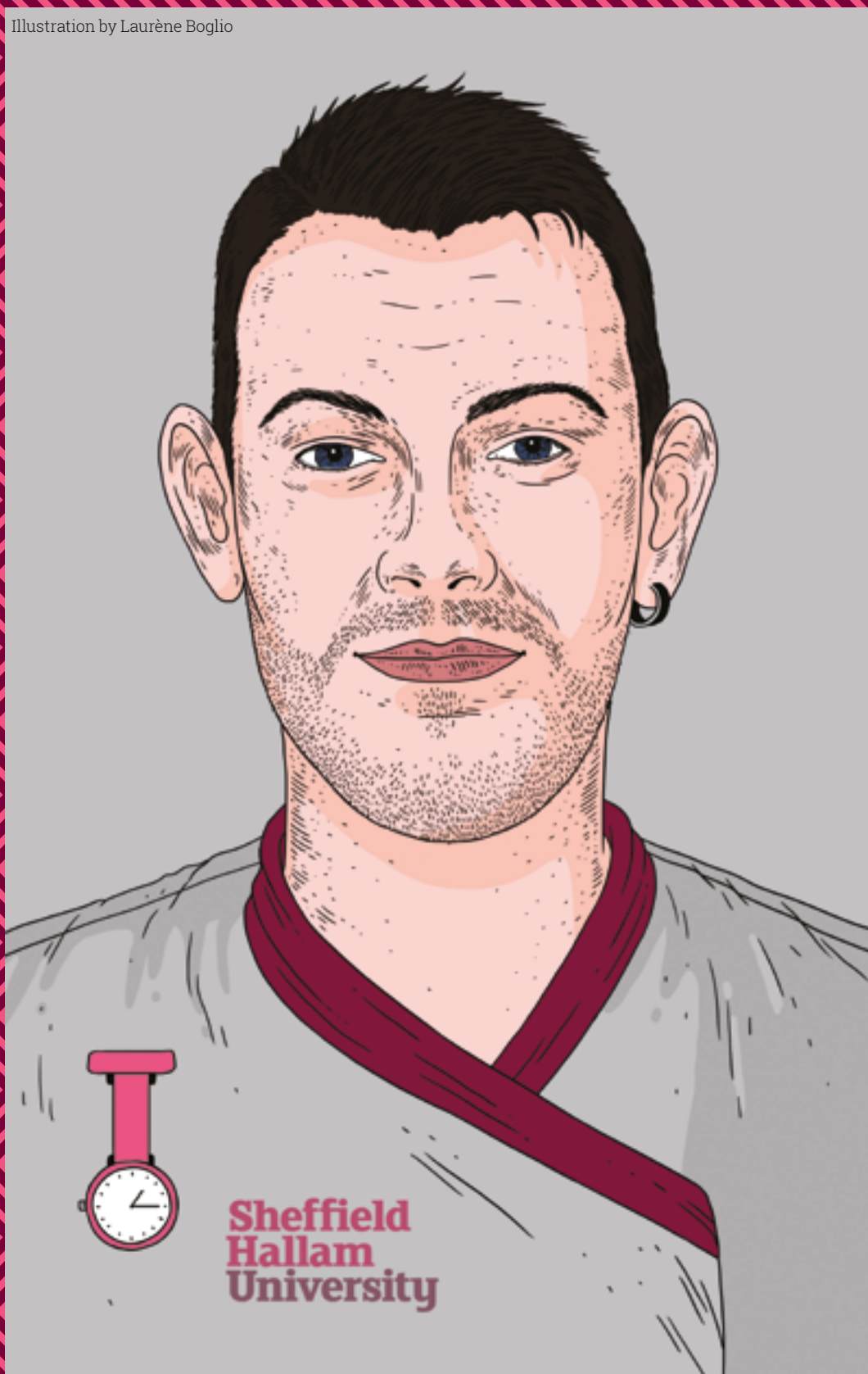
Our fashion design students enter the International Support Contest and the Fashion Awareness Direct competitions, showcasing their work at London Fashion Week.

Tell us about the group you set up.

It's called MINT – Men Into Nursing Together. Our tutors started it as a group for Hallam students, and I helped take on the leadership of it as one of the student members. When we got on social media we started getting interest and support from beyond Hallam. So we're there for our students, but we're also part of a bigger conversation about male representation in nursing.

How has it helped with your development?

Being in that conversation has got me thinking about all sorts of things: public perceptions of nursing, the resource pressures on the NHS, patient experience and preference. At the same time I've met new people in the nursing community. I've got relationships with students, educators and practitioners that I would never have had without MINT.

What's next for MINT?

We've done fundraising for a number of causes, and spoken at a couple of industry events too. We want to keep that momentum going, but stay grounded in the Hallam student community to offer support to those starting their careers. That's where MINT came from and I think it's really important to keep a focus on universities.

LUKE: 'I MAKE GAMES WITH SONY'

Our games students work with Sony to design and build games. Games software development student Luke Melville explains how it works.

Because of the PS4™ facilities we have access to, I've worked on projects that reflect what I'd face in industry. I worked on a real commercial code base on PS4™ development kits as part of my dissertation, and helped to create and release a virtual reality shooter as part of my third year module work. All of that will significantly improve my employability upon graduating.

We get a lot of technical support from Sony and they come in and give feedback on our work, which is really helpful. The best way to learn how to make games is to actually make them, so I'm learning a lot. In this industry employers want to know whether you've had your game released, and to have worked on something that's on the PlayStation® Store is a big CV boost.

Can I spend time abroad while I'm at Sheffield Hallam?

Yes. On many of our courses you can study or work abroad for up to a year. We also offer shorter opportunities such as field trips, study visits and placements, as a recognised part of your degree.

What will I get out of studying or working abroad?

You get to travel, experience another culture and improve your confidence and communication skills. It will also benefit your future job prospects – employers are looking for people who can demonstrate cultural awareness and experience.

Where can I go?

We have exchange agreements with over 100 universities across the world. You could spend time studying in Australia, Austria, Canada, China, the Czech Republic, Denmark, Finland, France, Germany, Hungary, India, Italy, Lithuania, Malaysia, the Netherlands, Poland, Portugal, Slovakia, Spain, Sweden, Switzerland, or the USA.

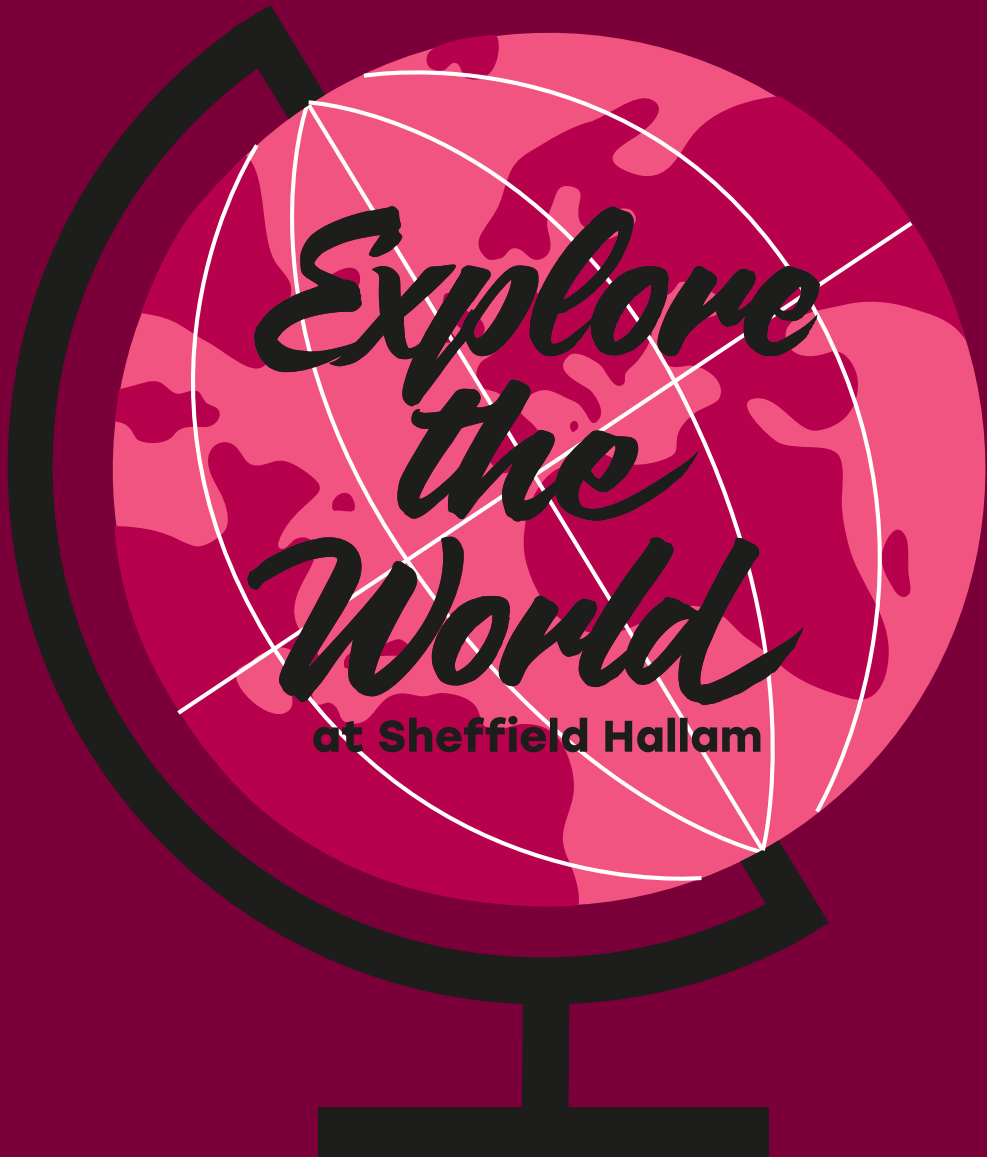
Do I need to speak the language?

No. Whatever country you study in you will be taught in English, unless you're studying a language as part of your degree.

Is there any financial help available?

Yes. If your placement is in Europe you can apply for an Erasmus+ grant* to help with the extra costs of living abroad. And at Sheffield Hallam you can also apply for up to £500 through GoGlobal.

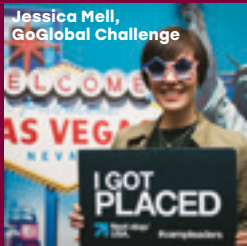

THE GLOBETROTTING VOLUNTEER

Politics student and aspiring lawyer Sherene Modi tells us about an eye-opening work placement in South Africa

What did you do on your placement?

I was teaching at African Angels, an independent school in the Eastern Cape region. I read with the children, ran small group activities, and gave one-on-one attention in study tasks. The school is one of the best opportunities for education in the area. We visited the local government school one morning and it was a stark contrast, with just four teachers for 179 pupils.

How did it help with your personal and academic development?

The placement was eye-opening. It made me realise how much I take for granted, even small things like electric light or clean kitchen facilities. At the same time, it inspired me to help the children learn. I was able to implement ideas from my own schooling, and it felt great to be trusted. My confidence has definitely been boosted.

What's next for you?

I'm now working as a paralegal in a law firm. I've always been interested in a career in law, and I'm pleased to have got the job I wanted so soon after graduation. I feel like a politics degree was a great foundation for it. The role will help me to decide whether the legal sector is the right path for me — at the moment, I am loving it and am learning so much.

HALLAM HELPED ME START MY OWN BUSINESS

Psychology student Aimee Browes is the founder and CEO of Happiness Bootcamp, which uses fitness to improve people's mental health.

Aimee started the business after suffering from anxiety herself, and deciding "enough was enough".

'Exercise has helped me massively. It was the best therapy I ever used,' she says.

'I set up Happiness Bootcamp up to educate people on mental wellbeing. To me being successful isn't making a million pounds, it is making a million people realise their life is worth living.'

'Through weekly Pop Pilates, workshops and training days we teach people how to cope with anxiety, stress, depression, eating disorders, body confidence and self-love, giving them the friendly environment and key scientific knowledge they need.'

'I found Hallam to be so supportive. They offered business support with the enterprise team, they helped me get volunteers on board, they helped me with getting yoga mats – really simple things that as a student you don't have access to.'

Happiness Bootcamp has been featured on BBC Radio 1 and in several national newspapers, and was among the five finalists of Student Start-up of the Year 2018. But for Aimee, the biggest buzz comes from seeing the change in bootcamp participants.

'What's so rewarding is knowing that people who are coming along are in the situation that I was in before,' she says. 'It's lovely to see them leaving and feeling better about themselves.'

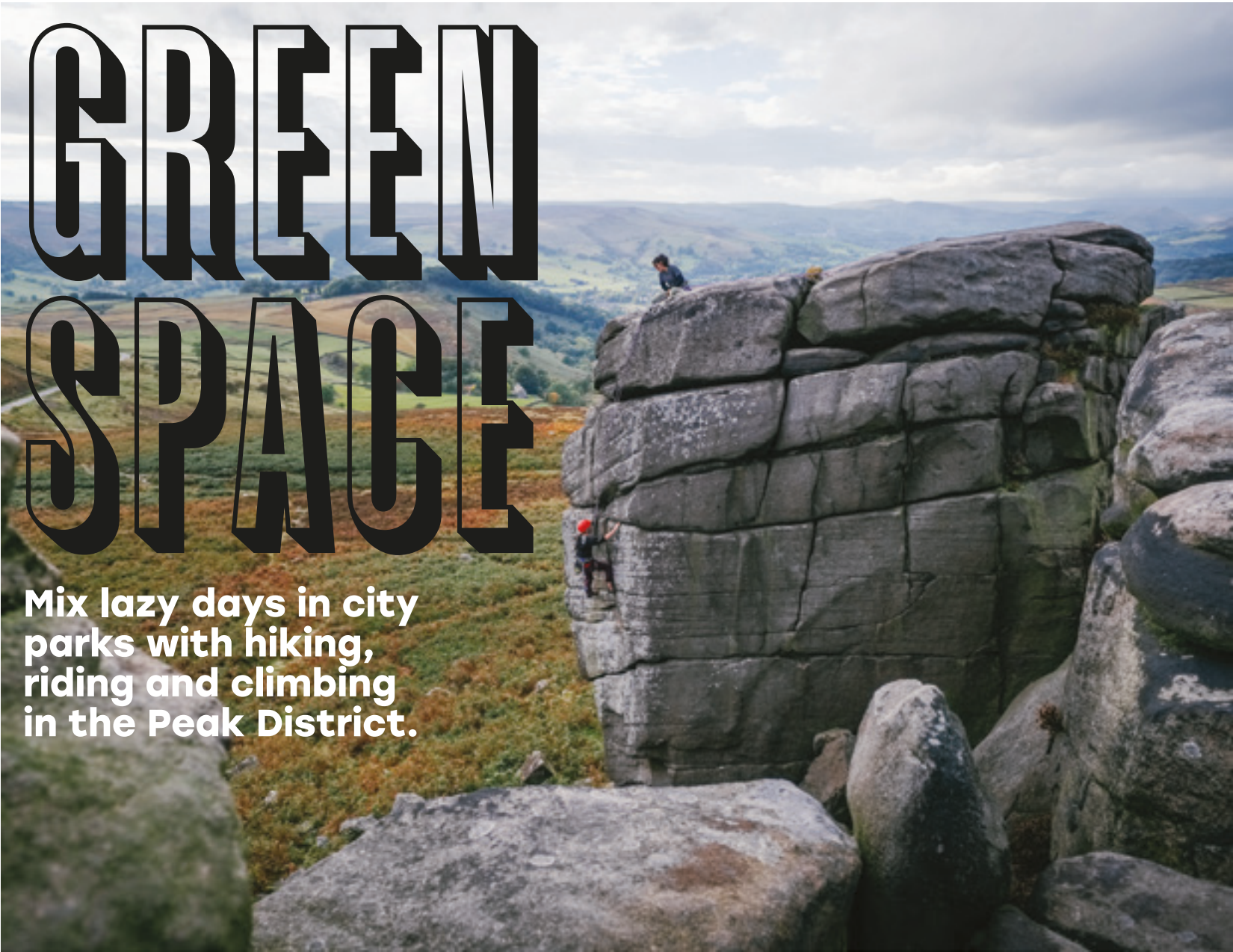

There's a national park on our doorstep. For nearby adventures, ride the bike trails at Lady Canning's Plantation or climb at Stanage Edge. For day trips, hop on a train into the Hope valley or a bus to Chatsworth. .

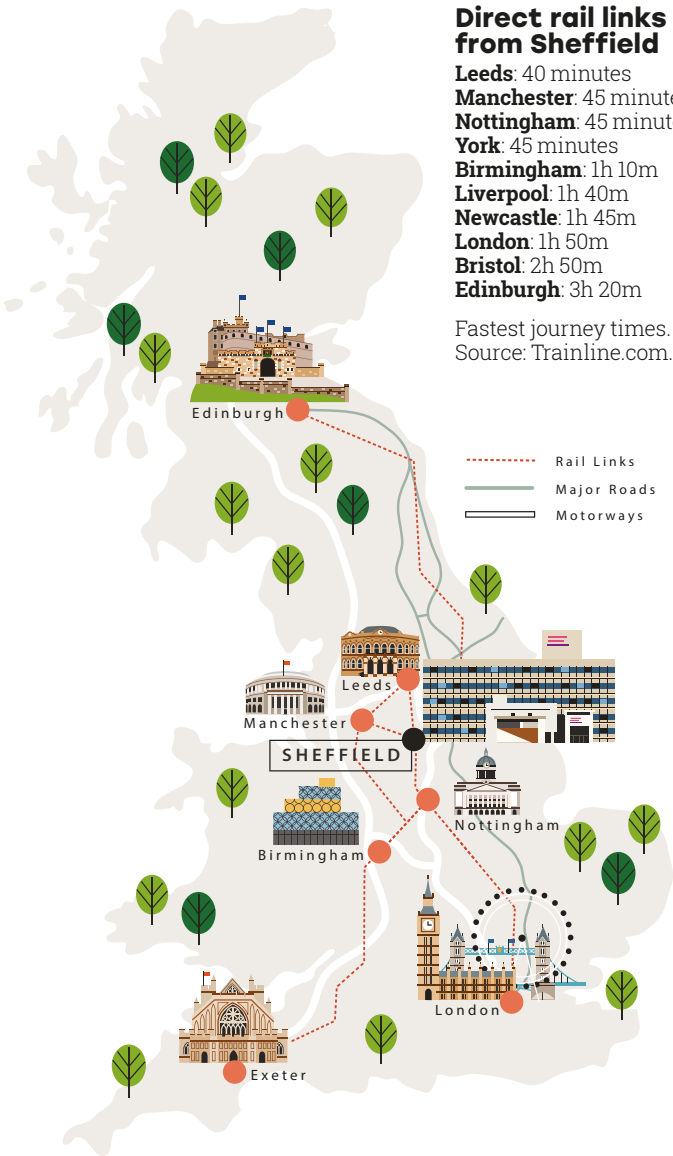

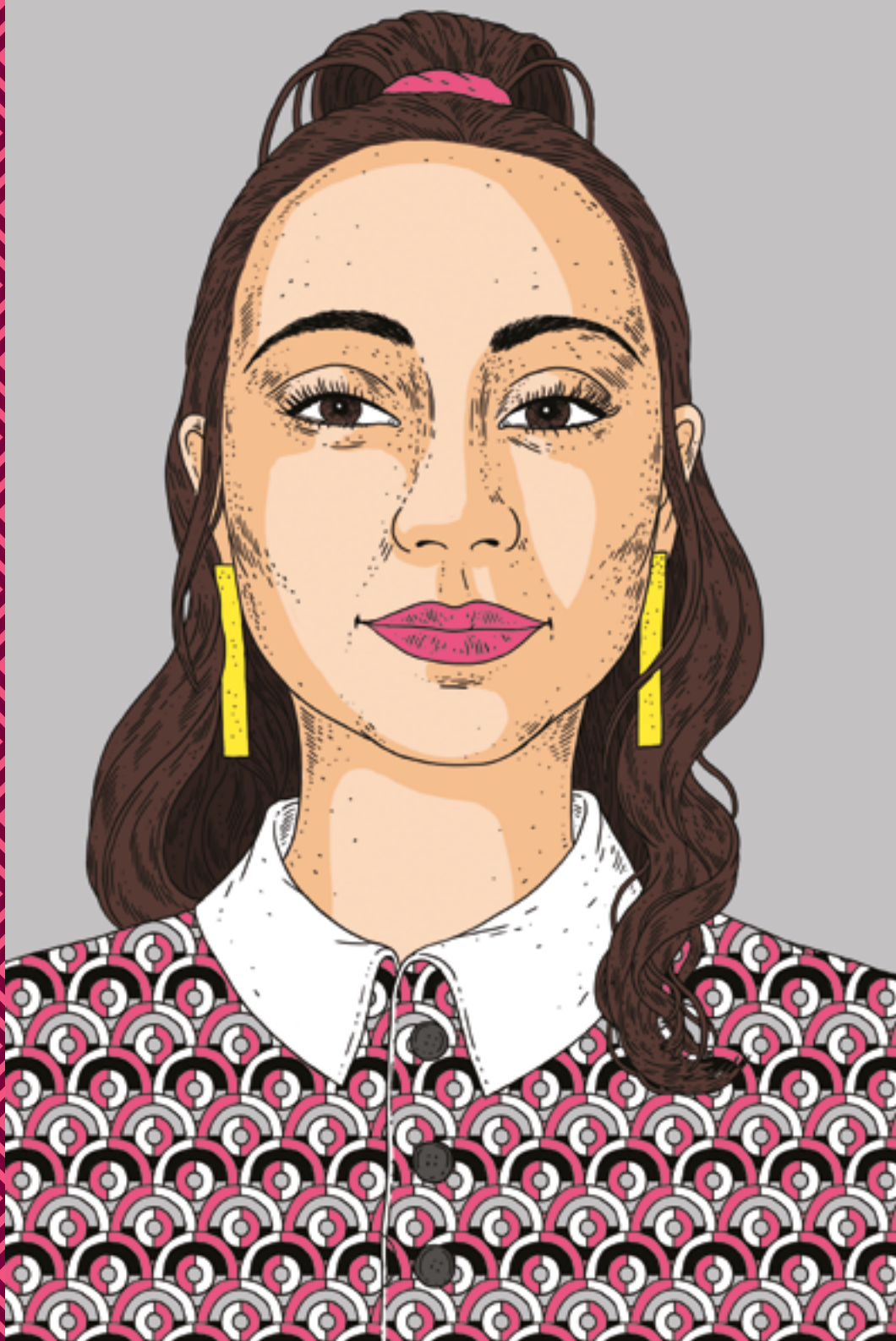

Wheelchair basketballer Charlotte Moore is studying human biology while she trains for Tokyo 2020

How do you balance training and study?

During induction week my course leader suggested talking to my academic adviser. They're a personal contact who can help if you need to manage your attendance or deadlines, which is a really important relationship to have as a student athlete. If I know I'll be away for a tournament I can get access to lecture materials earlier through the University's Blackboard system, and my lecturers are really open and approachable, so I can go to them if I've missed something or don't understand it.

How are you finding the sports facilities here?

The team has its own court at the English Institute of Sport (EIS) in Sheffield. Training in a facility like that really helps you prepare for tournaments. I also do extra strength and conditioning on campus – it's great to be able to go between lectures when I can't make gym times at EIS. In terms of wheelchair accessibility I've had no problem getting around, and I've never had to rush from one place to another for back-to-back lectures. There's always a lower desk for me in lab classes too, so it's easy to carry out practicals.

What's next for you?

We've got a European championship in summer which is a qualifier for Tokyo, and we want to get into the final and get silver or gold. Then we'll be into preparation for the Tokyo Games. We've got a friendly tournament out there in August, which is kind of a test for 2020. So training will get a lot more intense in the coming months and years.

With support from Hallam and Team GB I'm confident I'll be able to handle it.

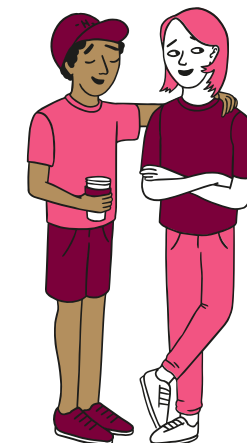

'I was able to integrate with other students by telling them all about the city,' she says. Places to eat, places to go shopping and so on. I also found it easy to talk to international students because I was interested to know their experiences, as my parents are originally from Bangladesh.'

'One of the great elements of Hallam is the diversity of the student body,' he says.

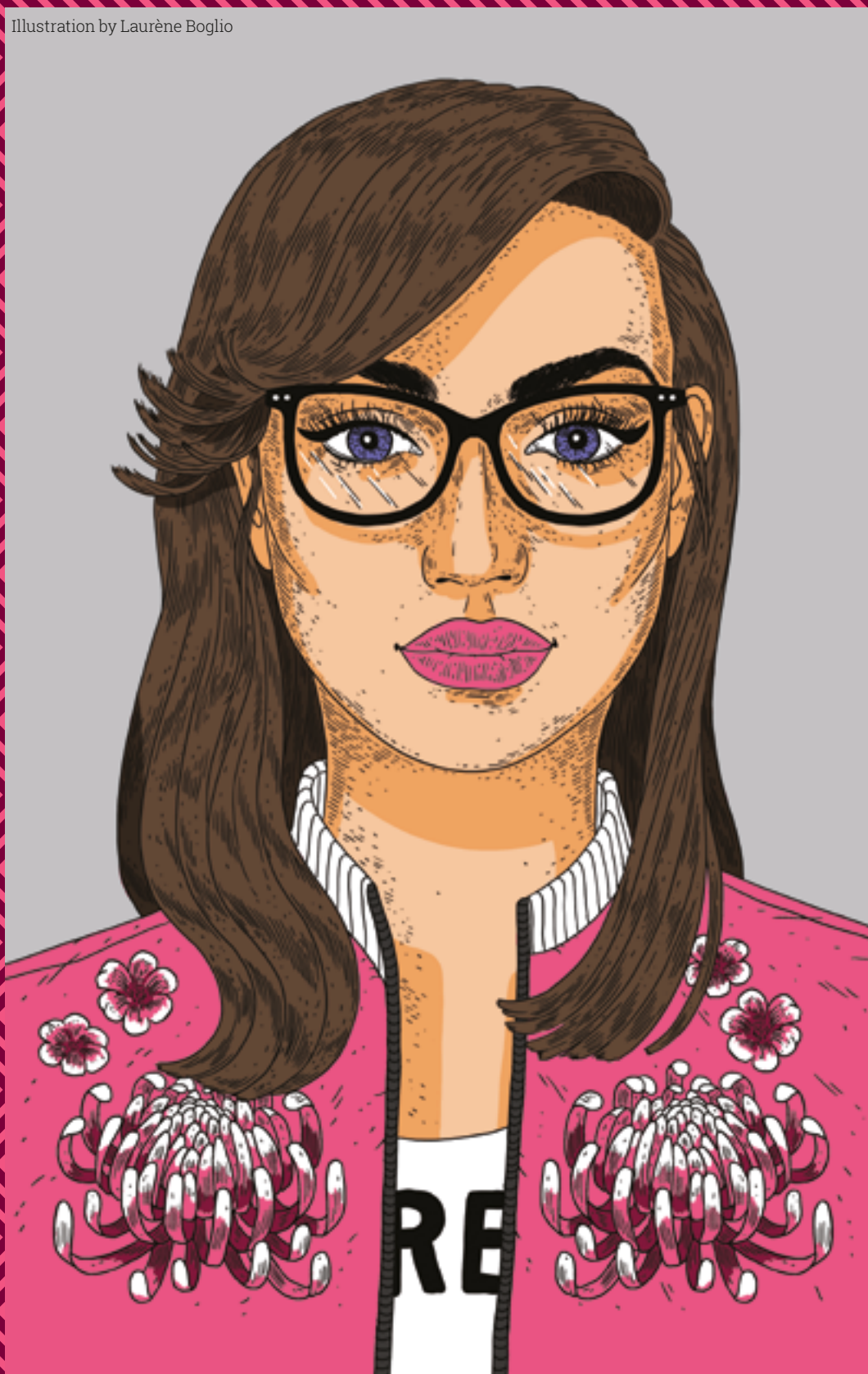
'I got involved with IET as I wanted to develop my international outlook. I plan to do an MSc in International Business Management, so developing cultural capital and experience of other cultures is important.'

THE SELF-STARTER

Lin Alhaj Hussin fled Syria in 2013 with no English. Now she mixes a biomedical science degree with translation work, volunteering and even a radio show

What support did you get from Hallam?

In Syria I didn't have assignments, I only had exams based on books. I didn't know how to write an essay or a lab report. I contacted my tutor and found out about the Skills Centre. It's for people who need English support sessions, maths support, referencing, all sorts of things. I attended academic writing sessions, which were really helpful.

How has your part-time work and volunteering helped you develop?

I'm an Arabic-English translator for the NHS. I work in hospitals, in surgeries, with midwives, with health visitors, with nurses, everything. And it's a professional job, so it has also enhanced my CV. I got six work placements through interpreting too, so when I go to interviews I'll have all these experiences to talk about. I also volunteer with the British Red Cross, both as a first aider and on ambulance crews. I'm going for the Hallam Gold award, because it's nice to be recognised for what you are doing, and to inspire others.

What was it like adjusting to life in Sheffield?

I do a radio show on the community station Link FM, and we talk about Sheffield a lot – about how welcoming the city is. People are really friendly. When you say something wrong no-one laughs. They correct you, they smile. That's so important for someone coming from abroad. It's really multicultural. My first show was with the Lord Mayor of Sheffield, Magid Magid. We talked about immigration and how immigrants feel being in the UK. He's the Lord Mayor of Sheffield and he's a Somali refugee!

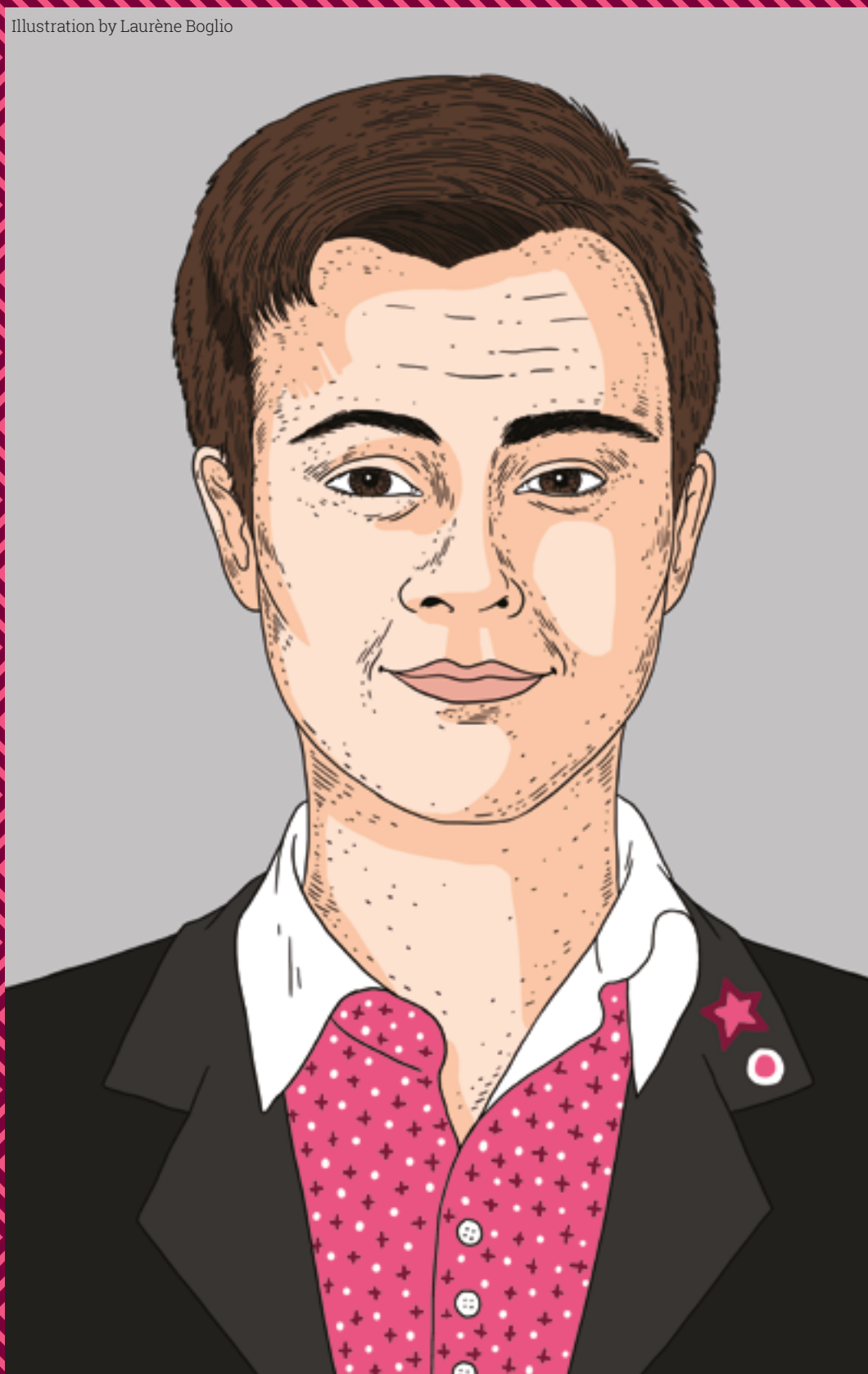
Faith and spirituality

Public relations and media student Luke Allan went from a nervous new arrival to an LGBT+ Student Representative and NUS delegate

What brought you to Hallam?

Lots of my friends researched things like nightlife or alumni, but I had other priorities too. Things like how diverse the student community and the city is, how safe and welcomed I might feel, and whether the university and wider community is gay friendly. I remember typing 'LGBT Sheffield Hallam' into Google and finding a huge amount of information. After visiting an open day, I knew Sheffield Hallam was somewhere I could call home.

How did you get involved in the LGBT+ community?

When I arrived for Welcome Week, I was nervous – but I attended an LGBT+ event and immediately felt part of the community. I soon became empowered to improve the experiences of others. As an LGBT+ Student Representative and NUS delegate, I've been involved with shaping policy at a regional and national level. Throughout, I've tried to ensure that current and future LGBT+ students would receive the best possible support!

What kind of support is available?

There is a fantastic LGBT+ liberation group and an elected officer within the Students' Union, and they work closely with the University to develop policies, initiatives and events. There are also dedicated careers advisers who specialise in supporting LGBT+ students. The wellbeing service is great at offering counselling, and my lecturers were really supportive with any of the issues I was experiencing within but also outside of university.

UK and EU students

Tuition fees and funding

- Tuition fees for UK and EU students starting in 2019 are £9,250.
- We charge a reduced fee of £1,200 for your placement year.
- Most UK and EU students apply for a tuition fee loan from Student Finance England to pay their fees. You don't pay anything upfront, and you only start paying back when you're earning at least £25,000.
- UK students and some EU students can receive up to £8,700 in funding to help with living costs.
- There's lots of support to help you manage your money while you're at university.

Scholarships at Sheffield Hallam

We are investing over £5 million in 2019-20 in financial support for students which will mean more students than ever can access financial support while they're studying here.

Here are some of the scholarships available for students starting in 2019.

Student Success Scholarship

Receive up to £2,000 plus extra support during your time at Sheffield Hallam based on your income, course type or personal circumstances.

If you're leaving care, we guarantee to provide you with a support package of £3,500 for every taught year of your course.

Performance Athletes Support Programme

If you compete in sport at the highest level, you could receive up to £6,000 alongside a comprehensive high performance support package. This programme is also open for international and EU students.

Apply online
through UCAS

You can apply for our full-time undergraduate courses online through UCAS from mid-September to the end of June. Aim to submit your application by 15 January, as courses can be closed to applications after this date.

Fulfil any additional
requirements

Some of our courses require you to submit a portfolio or attend a selection event or audition. If you're outside the UK, this might take place over Skype or in your country. We'll send you information to help you prepare, including details of the date, time and location of selection and audition events.

Check your application
status on UCAS

You can check the progress of your application using UCAS Track. It's the first place you'll be able to see whether you've been accepted on the courses you've applied for, and you can also use it to reply to your offers. You can also set up email alerts, so Track can notify you when there's an update on your application.

STEP 4 → STEP 5 → STEP 6

Receive your offer

We usually start to make offers from October onwards. Offers are either conditional or unconditional. A conditional offer is usually dependent on your results, but might include other requirements such as professional skills tests or an English language assessment if English is not your first language. An unconditional offer means you have a place with no academic requirements – but you might still need to meet non-academic conditions such as a DBS check.

Choose your firm and
insurance choices

If you have conditional offers from more than one university you need to decide on a firm choice and an insurance choice. It's a big decision – if you can, visit all the universities you have offers from so you can get a feel for which choice is right for you. You can confirm your choices on UCAS Track. If you accept an unconditional offer as your firm choice you won't need to choose an insurance choice, as your place will be confirmed immediately.

Accept your offer and
confirm your place

If you meet the conditions of your offer, we'll confirm your place on UCAS Track. If you don't get the results you were expecting we may still be able to accept you so check UCAS Track before you do anything else. If you're from outside the UK, you may need to pay a deposit to confirm your place. You'll then receive a Confirmation of Acceptance for Studies (CAS), which you will need to apply for a visa. If you find yourself without a place, or change your mind when you get your results, you can contact us to discuss your options. We'll also have comprehensive clearing information online.

Information for UK students

What do you need to get on your course?

All of our courses have their own entry requirements, which will include GCSEs and A levels/BTECs, or equivalents, and may require qualifications in specific subjects, or relevant experience.

What are tariff points?

We use the UCAS tariff to display our entry requirements. This means we list the number of UCAS points you need to join the course. You get points from achieving grades in a range of qualifications (see table).

How can I get the tariff points I need?

You can make up the points we are asking for through A levels or BTECs, or a mixture of the two, or any other qualifications that we recognise as being equivalent.

We also accept non-tariff qualifications such as recognised foundation courses and international qualifications.

We consider each application carefully, including how you demonstrate a commitment to succeed, and we look for relevant skills and experience – for example through employment, caring, voluntary work or private study which supports your preparedness for study.

Information for international students

Most courses require a minimum IELTS score of 6.0 with at least 5.5 in all skills. IELTS requirements do vary by course. See the course entry on our website for further details.

Improving your English language skills

Every year, our experienced English language tutors help more than 1,000 students from all over the world to develop English language skills and progress to their undergraduate studies.

We offer five, ten and fifteen week pre-session courses and longer term courses, depending on your current IELTS level and the level required by your degree course. FOUNDATION YEARS

An alternative route to undergraduate study

Foundation years are one-year courses that prepare you for an undergraduate degree. They're a good option if you don't have the qualifications for the course you want to do, or don't feel quite ready for degree-level study.

When you pass your foundation year you'll progress to the first year of the undergraduate degree, with a guaranteed place.

What happens during a foundation year?

During your foundation year you'll have a chance to adapt to university life and get to know Sheffield Hallam University's campuses and staff.

You'll also learn the essentials of your chosen subject, so you'll have all the knowledge and experience you need when your first year of undergraduate study begins.

If you are a UK or EU student, you can also apply for financial support from Student Finance England during your foundation year.

What foundation years are available?

Over 80 of our degree courses are available with a foundation year entry route.

You can also study one of seven foundation years that cover a whole subject area. You choose which degree course to progress onto at the end of the foundation year.

'I decided to do a foundation year because I didn't get the grades I'd hoped for. I thought I wasn't going to be able to study games, but I got told about the foundation year and thought, 'Awesome. There's an art and design course that'll help me go on and do what I want to do.' It was perfect for me.

'The benefit of a foundation year is that you learn about the university and find your way around. You learn how everything works: how to submit assignments, what the teaching is like. All the fundamentals that you need to move on to your degree.

'Transitioning from foundation year to my degree was really easy. The course leader was easy to talk to, and if I had any questions I could just go to them and ask. Once I passed I had a lot of options to pick from, and I decided to go down the games design route.

The role of the Students' Union

The Students' Union is the voice of students in the University, and students are represented at all levels up to the the Board of Governors.

Working in partnership with the University, the Students' Union coordinates the highly effective Student Representation System by providing training and support to Course and Department Reps. Within a few weeks of joining the University, you will be given the opportunity to become a Course Rep – representing the views of your coursemates to staff and shaping your course. The Students' Union also has an advice centre, which supports students with individual academic issues.

Students' Union membership: Education Act 1994

Under the provisions of the Education Act 1994, any student has the right not to be a member of the Students' Union and not to be unfairly disadvantaged with regard to the provision of services, or otherwise, by reason of having exercised that right.

At Sheffield Hallam University all students, members and non-members alike, have in general the right of access to services provided by the University and the Sheffield Hallam University Union of Students (also known as the Students' Union).

However, the right to participate in the Students' Union and NUS (National Union of Students) elections and decision-making processes, including those of clubs and societies, is not extended to non-members.

On the basis of the above arrangements, the University is satisfied that the range of services otherwise provided by the University and the Students' Union to students (whether members of the union or not) are sufficient to ensure that non-members are not unfairly disadvantaged within the meaning of the Act.
