
1834 A School of Medicine and Surgery - the foundations of Newcastle University - is established.


1849

Sustainable Newcastle

We're tackling some of the biggest challenges our planet has ever known.

We're committed to social and environmental justice in everything we do. Our pioneering research supports the United Nations Sustainable Development Goals (UNSDGs) to protect the planet and end poverty and inequality in all its forms.

We want to achieve net zero carbon dioxide emissions by 2030. Initiatives include reducing the energy we use on campus, managing our water consumption and flood risk, and improving the biodiversity of our green spaces.

We also believe you should have a voice when it comes to what happens to our world.

Our Students' Union Ethics and Environment representative will make your voice heard at University level, feeding back to both our Sustainability Committee and our Sustainable Development Goals Committee which develops and supports our approach to the United Nations SDGs.

And you can play your part in building a better world through our environmentally-focused student societies and volunteering opportunities co-ordinated by our Students' Union.



Students take research to Parliament

An analysis of the UK's progress towards the UNSDGs has been presented by our students to a cross-party group in the Houses of Parliament.

Working with Dr Graham Long and Dr Burak Tansel from the School of Geography, Politics and Sociology, the students co-authored three research papers on the UK's response at the halfway point in the United Nations 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development.

The papers were presented to an All-Party Parliamentary Group of MPs, peers, parliamentary staff and non-governmental organisations. The UK government's Foreign, Commonwealth and Development Office was also briefed on the research.

Politics student Gabrielle said: "To go to an APPG event in the Houses of Parliament was an amazing experience.

"Work on the SDGs is not only important to me, but has repeatedly come up throughout my degree, so it was nice to finally see SDG work getting somewhere and placed in the hands of those who can enact change in the UK."



Bright lights; beautiful city

A special place

Newcastle is a World Top 40 and UK Top 5 student city* and it's easy to see why.

Vibrant, exciting and effortlessly cool, it's the heart of our North East region, and our campus stands proudly in the centre.

With so much to see and do, and a welcoming multicultural community, you'll feel like you belong – one in six people here is a student.

It's also a compact city; easy to navigate on foot or by bike, with easy cycling routes to popular student suburbs and plenty of green spaces to enjoy on a sunny day.





Well connected

Fast road links connect the city with the rest of the UK. Regular trains from Newcastle Central Station make exploring hassle-free, whether that's a day trip to Edinburgh, just one and a half hours away, or a journey to London, in under three hours.

Direct flights to multiple UK and worldwide destinations from our international airport provide opportunities to visit new places, while making sure home is never far away.

A Metro transport system – the busiest light rail system outside of London – links our airport and railway station, as well as Newcastle's suburbs, and the beautiful North East coastline, just 25 minutes away.


Friendly and affordable

Natives of Newcastle are affectionately known as 'Geordies', but no-one really knows where the nickname came from.

Whatever the origin of the word 'Geordie', it's become synonymous with a city where the local people are known for their warmth, big personalities and great sense of humour. Newcastle is a place where you'll feel at home.

Your student budget will also go further here, too. A **Top 10 city for affordability in the UK***, Newcastle has a lower cost of living compared to other cities in the country. Student discounts and local travel passes make travel, both across the city and the wider North East, cost-effective.

City living

Newcastle's skyline is a rich architectural vista of historic and contemporary buildings – and one of the best places to enjoy the view is from the top of Grey's Monument.

Set in the heart of Grainger Town, the climb to the top of this landmark is worth it, just to see the city's historic quarter stretching out before you.

You can explore Grainger Town's indoor market serving up fresh groceries, breakfasts, brunches, pizza, tapas and more, catch a West End show at Newcastle's Theatre Royal, or see the world go by from one of the many cafés that line the magnificent Grey Street.

Stroll along Northumberland Street, the pedestrian-friendly shopper's paradise that runs through the city centre. Or head to Chinatown with its ornate paifang (archway) built by Shanghai craftsmen that leads on to a colourful community of shops, businesses, and restaurants.

Just a 20-minute walk from the city centre is the Quayside, a hub of music, food and nightlife loved by students. It's here you can see the seven bridges Newcastle is famous for, including the iconic Tyne Bridge and eye-catching Gateshead Millennium Bridge.

Not far from the centre, our creative quarter – Ouseburn – boasts a thriving arts scene and community-run farm. Or for café culture and independent local shops, try Jesmond, Heaton, Ouseburn and Gosforth – easily accessed by public transport or a leisurely walk.



Outdoor spaces

Across Newcastle, over 30 parks and open spaces help paint the city green.

In nearby Jesmond and Heaton, a public wooded dene creates a wildlife corridor with two adjoining parks. Perfect for walking, cycling and picnics on a sunny day, look out for the Shoe Tree where students throw old shoes up into the branches to celebrate the end of exams.

With a history dating back to the 12th century, the Town Moor comprises around 1,000 acres of open space. A unique backdrop for walking and cycling, it hosts the annual Hoppings – Europe's largest travelling funfair.

On the edge of campus, Exhibition Park is a perfect spot for picnics, with a lake, pavilion, skate park, all-weather sports court and café. It's also home to The Palace of Arts, a micro-brewery that hosts live music and events.

Art, music and culture in the city...

It's easy to soak up some culture in Newcastle starting with five theatres, multiple museums, cinemas and art galleries.

Unique venues include the BALTIC, a former flour mill that's now a centre for contemporary art, and The Glasshouse that overlooks the River Tyne. This music centre is almost as famous for its iconic glass and steel structure as it is for the international musicians that perform here.



...and on campus

You don't have to stray far from campus to immerse yourself in art, history, and culture. We have a number of partnership venues in and around our beautiful city-centre campus.

From ancient archaeology and contemporary art exhibitions to theatre performances, lunchtime concerts and thought-provoking architectural spaces, you won't be short of things to explore between seminars.

Nights out

Newcastle's nightlife is legendary – from bars and clubs set among classical architecture, to gigs and comedy nights, crazy golf and ghost tours.

Catch live music and new bands at local pubs and larger gigs at concert venues such as Utilita Arena Newcastle. See global stars at Newcastle United's stadium St James' Park which has famously hosted some of the biggest artists, from the Rolling Stones to Ed Sheeran and rising star, Tyneside-born singer songwriter Sam Fender.

Food and eating out

Our food scene is influenced by cultures from around the globe. Whether you're keen to try something new, or are craving a particular delicacy from your home culture, you'll be able to satisfy your appetite.

Enjoy street food, eat out at independent cafés and fine dining restaurants, or shop at local supermarkets and outdoor markets for the freshest of ingredients.

Take your taste buds on a world tour thanks to discount deals during NE1 Restaurant Week. Visit the Quayside Market's street food vendors for lunch on-the-go every Sunday, and enjoy fresh, locally caught fish at one of Newcastle's many fish and chip shops.

Newcastle is also the birth place of the national bakery Greggs, so if a pasty is more to your taste, you've come to the right place.

Sport

Newcastle is a proud sporting city. Home to Premier League Newcastle United Football Club, you'll hear the roar of devoted 'Toon Army' fans resounding across the city on match day. You can even take a rooftop tour of 'the Magpies' 52,000-capacity stadium.

For rugby union fans the Newcastle Falcons' Kingston Park ground is a convenient Metro ride away. Or you can cheer on the Newcastle Eagles, the most successful team in British Basketball League's history. Their purpose-built arena is within walking distance of the city centre.

On the outskirts of Newcastle, you'll find the sport of kings – horse racing. Founded in 1882, Newcastle Racecourse is one of the busiest in Britain hosting over 60 race meetings a year.

If cricket is your passion, hop on a bus or train to Durham County Cricket's Chester-le-Street ground – the home of first-class cricket in the North East and a former host of the Ashes.

Olympic heritage

Newcastle and the North East have their fair share of Olympic heroes – from Steve Cram, one of the most successful middle-distance athletes of all time, to England Lioness Jill Scott, and triple jumper Jonathan Edwards, whose world-record leap of 18.29 metres has yet to be broken.

An icon of track and field, Sir Brendan Foster competed in three Olympics before retiring and founding the world's biggest half marathon – the Great North Run. Hosted by Newcastle, every year 60,000 athletes and fun runners tackle the 13.1-mile route from the city to the finishing line at South Shields on the coast.

In the 2024 Paris Olympics, Newcastle University alumni James Rudkin and Tom Ford secured gold in rowing as part of the men's eight, while Tom's sister Emily claimed bronze in the women's eight.

Stunning landscapes, majestic castles, vibrant urban spaces, and beautiful coastlines make up the North East of England.



You'll learn in lots of different ways

Lectures, seminars and tutorials will be backed up by group work with peers and independent study as you explore your own ideas.

Depending on your degree how you learn could include:

- clinical placements and case-led study
- professional development programmes for example, our LifeWorkArt collaboration with local and national arts organisations
- business simulation a dynamic, experiential learning method, applying theory to real-world business scenarios
- practical classes using industry-standard equipment and techniques
- conferences by leading industry professionals
- fieldwork and field visits putting into practice what you've learned, or working with professionals in your chosen field
- workshops and studio-based teaching
- · projects, presentations and reports

You'll learn on campus through in-person teaching. If digital and online options make your learning better, we'll use them as we focus on delivering an outstanding academic experience.

Learning support

Learning at university is different to studying at school or college. You'll need to be more pro-active and self-motivated, but we'll work together to build the skills you need. Our support and services include:

Academic Skills Hub: developing study and digital skills, academic practice and writing, with one-to-one support, drop-in sessions and an online Academic Skills Kit (ASK). An ASK podcast, themed clinics, and the 'Your Skills' programme provide additional support, with specific study resources for international students.

Maths-Aid: drop-in sessions and bookable consultations for maths and statistics.

Language support: free in-sessional English classes and tutorials for non-native English speakers to improve reading, writing, listening and speaking skills. Find more information on page 38.

Digital resources: our virtual learning environment gives 24/7 access to course content, study materials, module and programme information. A lecture recording service supports note-taking and revision; a mobile app gives access to personal timetables, University and NUSU news, library accounts and more.



Language Resource Centre: free resources and opportunities for self-study language learning in over 100 languages, including English. Improve your language skills with PAL, our Peer-Assisted Learning programme of conversation groups and one-to-one sessions led by native-level speaking students. Or buddy up with a student from overseas to learn their language through our eTandem partnership.

State-of-the-art language learning software makes language learning fun and easy. The Centre also has a TV and film archive of more than 8,000 titles in dozens of languages, and on-site access to international TV channels.

Additional support: you can access practical and study skills support available through our Specialist Learning team and our Disability team. If you have a disability, long-term health, mental health or neurodiverse condition, get in touch with us early about your support needs. This will help us identify the support you need during your application to Newcastle. Find more information on page 48.



Global Opportunities

Discover new cultures and gain a new perspective on the world by studying abroad. Opportunities include:

Student exchange: study abroad for a semester or spend a full academic year at one of our exchange partner universities.

Summer school: take part in an overseas summer school, combining lessons, social and cultural activities and practical sessions.

Internship: our internships are offered in collaboration with external organisations. They include the unique opportunity to work for the International Coalition of Sites of Conscience, a network of some of the world's most important historic sites, museums and memorials that connect past struggles with today's human rights movements.

Our facilities

Where learning comes alive

Our facilities – both on and off campus – are cutting-edge and 5-star*; our library service is awarding-winning and our IT resources provide 24/7 support.

This is the exciting, state-of-the-art environment where your learning and ideas will take shape...

On campus

Armstrong Building: home to a number of subject areas, dedicated music and rehearsal studios and the iconic King's Hall used for graduations. In the King's Quad a statue of American Civil Rights activist Dr Martin Luther King Jr commemorates the 50th anniversary of his visit to campus to accept an honorary degree.

Culture Lab: our centre for digital media and film practice with industry-standard editing and production facilities.

Dame Margaret Barbour Building: housing our psychology facilities including a food sensory suite, forensic interviewing suite, behaviour lab and psychological testing cubicles. State-of-the-art facilities for sport and exercise science, including physiology and biomechanics labs, a gait track and extreme environments lab, are located in our Sport and Fitness Centre (see also page 54).

Farrell Centre: opened in 2023 as part of our School of Architecture, Planning and Landscape, featuring a public gallery, research and community space.

Great North Museum: Hancock: our on-campus museum with extensive collections, dating from prehistory to modern day. Our Wolfson Archaeology Laboratory is equipped to analyse archaeological materials and artefacts from a number of UK sites.

Hatton Gallery: a modern art exhibition and learning space with a history dating back to the early 20th century. The Hatton Gallery collection includes over 3,000 works from the 14th–20th centuries, stages a programme of modern and contemporary art exhibitions and events, and showcases student work as part of annual exhibits.

Herschel Building: specialising in mathematics, statistics and physics, with a cryogenics lab and dark lab for optical experiments.

King Edward VII Building: housing some of the UK's best fine art studios including specialist multi-media workshops.

King George VI Building: offering some of the best equipped teaching facilities for pharmacy in the UK.

Law School: law has been taught at Newcastle University for 100 years. Facilities include a dedicated law library and mooting room for mock trials.

Medical School and Dental School: one of the largest integrated teaching and hospital complexes in the UK, linking directly to Newcastle's Royal Victoria Infirmary.

Northern Stage: our on-campus theatre with three performance spaces for a range of dynamic and exciting productions.

Old Library Building: housing one of the foremost independent language learning centres in the UK, offering self-study materials in over 100 languages, language learning software and online English language study materials, audio-visual materials, movies, 40 live satellite TV channels and more. Ridley Building 2: specialising in biology and marine science, with 10 modern research-ready laboratories, aquariums and an algal culture suite.

Stephenson Building: a hub for the next generation of engineers, researchers, designers, and visionaries. A Makerspace for student creativity and entrepreneurship, digital learning spaces, testing facilities and multi-purpose teaching laboratories support world-leading engineering education. Three centres for digital manufacturing, sustainable propulsion and biomedical engineering are delivering world-changing research.



Newcastle Helix

A £350 million global innovation district in the heart of the city, the Helix will enhance your learning.

Bringing together academia and business, this 24-acre site is home to:

- the School of Computing, located in our Urban Sciences Building. A smart building, it has over 4,000 sensors inside and out, monitoring its performance and feeding data into our Urban Observatory. Facilities include a games lab, independent study spaces with over 300 PCs with Raspberry Pi3 and our wellbeing sensory space, 'The Retreat'
- The Frederick Douglass Centre with state-ofthe-art learning and teaching spaces
- The Catalyst which houses our three National Innovation Centres in ageing, data, and rural enterprise
- At the gateway to the Helix is our triple-accredited Business School.

Award-winning Library Service

Four libraries form our Library Service – the Philip Robinson Library, Marjorie Robinson Library Rooms, Walton Library for medical sciences, and the Law Library.

Resources include more than 800,000 print books, over 700,000 eBooks, 54,000 eJournal titles, databases and subject guides developed specifically for our degrees. Special Collections offer unique primary source material for research. Innovative study spaces, PC clusters and a laptop loan scheme are available.

We are the only university library in the UK to have received the Charter Mark award for excellence five times in a row. We now hold the Customer Service Excellence award which replaced it.

Facilities off campus

Two commercially run farms of more than 800 hectares support our research and teaching in food security, sustainable agriculture practices, nutrition and rural energy.

State-of-the-art marine science and engineering facilities include the Dove Marine Laboratory, a research hub used for field study and collecting expeditions, and £1 million research vessel The Princess Royal. Designed in-house by staff and students, the boat is based at the Blyth Marine Station.

Our Emerson Cavitation Tunnel is used to test models of ship's propellers and tidal turbines, with a 'slime farm' mimicking how microorganisms and algae grow on ships' hulls in seawater.

Digital resources

Through our virtual learning environment you'll get 24/7 access to your course content, our lecture recording and streaming service, and collaborate online with fellow students and tutors. Our IT support, including specialist software and a range of assistive technology, will help you make the most of our digital services. For more information see page 26.

Before you arrive

If you are not a native English speaker, or if you are a Student Visa application student, you will need to show that you have adequate knowledge of written and spoken English.

For direct entry to a Newcastle University course, in most cases you will need an overall IELTS score of 6.5 (or equivalent), but some courses may ask for a higher level of English language proficiency.

Student Visa application students also need to demonstrate proficiency at level B2 of the Common European Framework of Reference for Languages. This is equivalent to at least IELTS 5.5 in reading, writing, speaking and listening. gov.uk/student-visa/knowledge-of-english

IELTS requirements are included in the entry requirements section of our course information online. IELTS (or equivalent) and pre-sessional entry requirements can be found online at ncl.ac.uk/pathway-courses/english-language-courses

If you do not meet our English language requirements, extra support is available.

You could complete a course to help improve your English before you start your degree. We provide these at the Newcastle University International Study Centre. Please check your course information for full details of the requirements.

Your Students' Union

The focus of student life on campus is our Students' Union Building. For more than 100 years, it's been the hub of events, activities and campaigns run by our students for students.

Newcastle University Students' Union (NUSU) is led by our Sabbatical Officers. Over 1,000 student reps advocate for students' academic interests, alongside Liberation Officers representing communities including students of faith or belief, disabled students, LGBTQ+, students of diverse ethnicity, working class students, student carers and marginalised genders. Major decisions are voted on at Student Council every month.

By listening to all students, NUSU shapes its priorities. In 2023-24 it lobbied local and national government for increased student support during the cost-of-living crisis, addressed student housing challenges, tackled discrimination in all its forms, and raised awareness of the issues disabled students face.

Funding your future



Invest in you

A degree with us isn't just a life-changing educational experience, it's also your gateway to career success.

You'll boost your employment prospects and develop the skills and graduate attributes that will help you stand out to employers in a competitive job market.

Here's what you need to know about funding your university dreams and how we'll be there to support you.

Fees and costs

You'll be charged a tuition fee for each year of your degree. As a general principle, you should expect the tuition fee to increase in each subsequent academic year of your course, subject to government regulations on fee increases and in line with inflation.

You'll also need to factor in other costs, such as rent, food, textbooks, course materials and subject-related expenses such as field trips, entertainment, and travel. For more information about living costs in Newcastle and the cost-of-living support we've put in place, see pages 58-59.

Tuition fee discounts

We offer a range of ways to pay your tuition fees, together with instalment plans to spread the cost of your studies and the following discounts:

- all students: 2% discount if you pay your annual fees in full before the end of registration week
- international students: 10% discount to close relatives of Newcastle University students and graduates

Funding your degree

UK students: most full-time undergraduate students finance their studies by applying for government-backed loans. This funding usually consists of:

- Tuition fee loan: this covers the full cost of your course and is paid directly to the University
- Maintenance loan: this helps towards living costs.
 The amount you receive will depend on your household income, where you live, and where you choose to study

You won't have to pay your loans back until after your course, when you're earning above a certain level.



Where you live and your awarding body (Student Finance England, Student Awards Agency Scotland, Student Finance Wales, Student Finance Northern Ireland) will dictate how much you can apply for; other criteria may also apply.

If you're an EU, EEA or Swiss national with settled or pre-settled status, you could be eligible for funding support from Student Finance England. Find out more at **gov.uk/student-finance**

International students: if you're an international student, you may be able to apply for funding from your own government, industry sponsorship, a scholarship, private grant or loan.

Scholarships

We invest millions in scholarship schemes to support new, eligible undergraduate students to study with us. These schemes include:

- opportunity scholarships for UK students based on household income
- international/EU scholarships both full and partial awards

Choosing your degree

What you can study

Opportunity and flexibility are built into our degrees, helping you prepare for your future.

You can study:

- · a single subject
- · broaden your focus with a Joint Honours degree
- blend two or three from more than 20 subjects to create your own unique Combined Honours degree

Your degree will be three, four or five years in length depending on the subject and if it features a placement year or study abroad element.

Degree structure

Most degrees are divided into stages. Each stage lasts for one academic year, and you'll complete modules totalling 120 credits by the end of each stage. Many degrees enable you to take optional modules allowing you to specialise in areas of interest*.

During Stage 1, you'll develop a strong foundation in your subject, building the knowledge, understanding and skills required to succeed in the later stages of your degree.

Depending on your subject, you'll complete a research project or dissertation in your final year.

Many of our degrees offer the chance to achieve professional accreditation or a graduate pathway to accreditation.
